Good afternoon President Caputo, trustees, honored guests, officers of administration, faculty, family and friends and the Class of 2003. I am grateful to have the honor of speaking to you this afternoon at the commencement ceremony. Please allow me to share with you some of my thoughts as I come to the end of my degree in the School of Education at Pace University.
