Presented to the student whose positive contributions to University life and whose academic accomplishments exemplify the highest level of achievement attainable for an undergraduate.

Christopher Keogh, Westchester

*BA, adolescent education and English
Dyson College of Arts and Sciences*

In addition to distinguishing himself academically, Christopher Keogh has made a positive impact on the Pace community through service. Keogh is a member of the Pforzheimer Honors College and several distinguished honor societies: Golden Key Honour Society, Alpha Chi Honor Society, and the Dyson Society of Fellows. He served as treasurer of the English Honor Society Sigma Tau Delta, vice president of Future Educators Association, and president of National Residence Hall Honorary.

His awards and honors include making the Dean's List, a President's Scholarship, the Dyson EPortfolio Award, the Writing Enhanced Curriculum Award, and Pace Pride Awards for Outstanding Student Leader, the Silver Gavel Society, and Who's Who in American College Students. Keogh was chosen to represent Pace University as a delegate at the 2008 National Conference on Student Leadership. A vocal advocate for campus life, Keogh was a selection representative for the Dow Hall Council, treasurer of the New Dorm Hall Council, president of the Resident Hall Association, and a resident assistant.

For the benefit of Pleasantville Cottage schoolchildren, he organized the events "Hope for the Holidays" and "Come Out and Play." Keogh assisted with the Jacob Burns Film Center's Educational program and, as a part of the Ossining school district's outreach program, worked on "High Hopes and Expectations." Regina G. Gennari, a member of the Pforzheimer Honors College, has appeared on the Dean's List, and is a member of the Golden Key International Honour Society. An active participant in Project Pericles, Gennari served as faculty assistant for Civic Engagement, program facilitator for "Debating Democracy," and organized Project Pericles's "Discussion without Borders" as a part of the program's Political Action for Human Rights Series on Immigration and the Immigrant Experience. Along with other members of Project Pericles, Gennari traveled to New Orleans over spring break to help support Habitat for Humanity's efforts to rebuild the city.

She distinguished herself as president of the Dyson Senate of Student Government Association, as conference liaison for the Faculty Institute program, "Reacting to the Past," as treasurer and director of programming for the Stonewall Coalition, and as director and organizer of the V-Day Campaign. Gennari was the recipient of Pace's Jeannette K. Watson Fellowship Recipient in support of non-profit internship work. She served as a teaching assistant to Pace Psychology professor Yvonne Rafferty, PhD, and as a student aide in the Women's and Gender Studies department. She was a Strategy and Communication Department intern at Echoing Green, an organization that invests in and supports emerging social entrepreneurs. In addition, she received a Social Innovation Fellowship to the StartingBloc Institute for Social Innovation. Gennari was also a legal assistant to State Supreme Court Justice Rosalyn Richter.

After graduation, Gennari will be working at an orphanage in Cambodia teaching English and literacy skills to Khmer children.

A dedicated member of the Pforzheimer Honors College, Nicole Papaioannou worked in the Honors office and was the editor of the award-winning Pforzheimer Honors College newsletter *SCHOLASTICA*. In addition to serving as vice president of the Golden Key International Honour Society and as a member of the Sigma Tau Delta International English Honor Society, Papaioannou appeared on the Dean's List and made her mark at Pace through her involvement in campus outreach activities.

An athlete as well as a scholar, Papaioannou was captain of the equestrian team, and a member of the Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC). She welcomed visitors to Pace as tour guide for the University's Welcome Center and contributed to University life as a participant in Project Pericles, a national organization of colleges and universities committed to making socially responsible and participatory citizenship an essential part of education.

Charles North, New York City

English and Poet-in-Residence, advisor to Aphos Literary Magazine

Dyson College of Arts and Sciences

Called by James Schuyler "the most stimulating poet of his generation" and by the Washington Post "one of the most memorable of contemporary poets," Charles North is the author of eleven books of poems, including the recently published *Cadenza*; a book of essays on poets, artists, and critics, *No Other Way*; and collaborative works with artists and other poets. With James Schuyler, he edited the anthologies *Broadway: A Poets and Painters Anthology* and *Broadway 2*.

His previous poetry collection, *The Nearness of the Way You Look Tonight*, was chosen as one of five finalists for the inaugural Phi Beta Kappa Poetry Award for best poetry book of the year. North's poetry has appeared in many important periodicals and more than thirty anthologies, including *Post-Modern Poetry in America* (Norton), *Best American Poetry* (Scribner), and *New York Poets II* (Carcanet). Among his numerous awards are two National Endowment for the Arts Fellowships, Four Fund For Poetry Awards, and most recently, a Foundation for Contemporary Arts, 2008 Grants to Artists Award.

He has been full-time Poet-in-Residence at Pace University (NYC) since 1997. North also is faculty advisor to *Apros*, the Pace literary magazine and is a two-time winner of the National Endowment for the Arts Creative Writing Fellowship, and a recent finalist for the inaugural Phi Beta Kappa Poetry Award.

Christian N. Madu, PhD, New York City

Research Professor of Management and Program Chair

Lubin School of Business

Christian N. Madu is Research Professor of Management Science and co-editor of the *International Journal of Quality and Reliability Management*, Topic Editor, *Encyclopedia of the Earth*, and founding editor, *International Journal of Quality Science*. He joined Pace University in 1984 as an adjunct and became a full time faculty in 1985.

Madu is involved in interdisciplinary research that has crossed many fields including statistical modeling, technology transfers, strategic planning, supply chain management, quality management and environmental management. He teaches courses in operations management, management science, and statistics. Serving as the chairman of the Management Science department for more than ten years, Madu actively engages in research and has published more than 100 research journal publications and more than a dozen scholarly books. His current area of research interest is in community-based environmental decision making. Professor Madu is on the editorial board of several academic journals.

Professor Madu's teaching philosophy is that each student is capable of learning and contributing to the society if they apply themselves. He

encourages students to learn beyond the classroom and to see their learning at Pace as a subsystem of their global systemic learning experience.

Professor Madu received a BS in Industrial Engineering (IE) from the State University of New York at Buffalo, MBA, MSIE from the University of New Haven, MBA from Baruch College, and MPhil, PhD from City University of New York.

Linda Anstendig, EdD, Westchester

Associate Dean and Professor of English

Dyson College of Arts and Sciences

Linda Anstendig, PhD, who has degrees from Connecticut College, Harvard University School of Education, and Columbia Teacher's College, is an Associate Dean of Dyson College of Arts and Sciences, and Professor of English . As Director of Writing for her department, Co-Director of Writing Across the Curriculum, and as former co-director of the Pforzheimer Faculty Development Center, Anstendig organized and led many workshops for faculty: on teaching writing, using writing to learn course content, developing course assessment techniques, incorporating technology into the curriculum, and creating civic engagement courses.

Anstendig's publications include a text book, *Writing through Literature*, and numerous refereed journal articles on writing across the curriculum, service learning, and writing with technology. Recent publications, are a chapter in Peter Seldin's *Teaching Portfolios* (co-authored with Professor Connie Knapp), and a chapter in a book for college teachers called *It Really Works: Ideas from Award Winning English Teachers*. Since 1990, she has presented over thirty papers at conferences dedicated to College English and Writing as well as General Education issues. Anstendig has also served as a consultant for local colleges and high schools on teaching writing, has been involved with national organizations dedicated to English studies and Writing Across the Curriculum, and has been active locally as an advocate for the Westchester Library System.

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
