With more than a decade of experience in the healthcare industry, Kamille E. Wright has emerged as one of the most dynamic, compassionate, and progressive Healthcare Executives in the United States. A native New Yorker, in 2005, Ms. Wright was recruited to work for the Los Angeles Department of Health Services. She made history when she was appointed as the youngest and the first African American female Chief Operating Officers of King Drew Medical Center (KDMC) located in the impoverished area of Watts. In this capacity, Kamille worked with a specialized team of executives to undertake the difficult task of revitalizing and stabilizing the hospital. Since then, she has worked in a variety of executive roles with the Department of Health Services at Rancho Los Amigos National Rehabilitation Center, the Office of Ambulatory Care, and currently in the Office of Nursing Affairs.

Throughout her career, Kamille has served in various senior executive roles including as the Associate Director of Network Operations for the New York City Health Hospitals Corporation's Central and North Brooklyn Family Health Networks.

Wright's professional affiliations include: the National Association of Health Services Executives (NAHSE) and the American College of Healthcare Executives (ACHE). She is the immediate past President of the New York Regional Chapter of the National Association of Health Services Executives (NAHSE). Kamille also served as the Vice President of the New York Metropolitan Chapter of the Norfolk State University Alumni Association. Ms. Wright has been featured in numerous publications and periodicals including the *Medical Herald Newspaper* as a "Healthcare Trailblazer". Two of her articles: "How to Succeed in Healthcare Management" and "Stress Reduction Strategies for the Busy Professional" were featured in the *Network Journal*.

A dedicated educator, Wright served on the faculty of the College of New Rochelle's Brooklyn campus as an Adjunct Professor and is on the faculty of Colorado Technical University On-Line. She has been a recipient of several awards including the 2008 NY Metro NSU Alumna of the Year and the 2007 NYR Chapter NAHSE President's Award. Adding to Kamille's accolades is her induction as an honoree into the healthcare industry's leading publication *Modern Healthcare Magazine's* 2009 Class of "Up and Comers". Each year the publication recognizes only 12 rising stars, from around the nation, who are 40 years and under.

Ms. Wright's educational credentials include: a M.S. in Health Services Administration and Policy from the New School University; a B.S. in Nursing from Pace University's Lienhard School of Nursing; and a B.A. in Political Science from Norfolk State University. Ms. Wright is an alumna of the California Healthcare Leadership College sponsored by Russell Reynolds Executive Search Firm designed to prepare Next Generation CEOs. She is also a proud graduate of the Greater New York Hospital Association's Fellowship Program in healthcare management; she is currently preparing to

embark on another fellowship with the California Healthcare Foundation's Healthcare Leadership program designed for clinicians.

Understanding the importance of helping to prepare the next generation, Kamille mentors several young people in various fields. In her spare time she enjoys traveling, sport fishing and volunteering for worthy causes geared towards women and girls. Despite the myriad of degrees, affiliations, honors, and awards, Kamille attributes her success to having a strong faith in God, fortitude, and a supportive family.

I was working on a restoration of the famous Fighting 69th's bar at the Armory located at 26th and Lexington Avenue in New York City on September 10, 2001. On the 11th, I volunteered to work for the Soldiers of the Fighting Irish Unit. I was the only civilian allowed by the Commanding Officer, LTC Geoffrey Slack, to come into the Armory. On that day, the Unit was changed from just Irish members to a rainbow coalition. That first day, I volunteered throughout the night until the next morning. I gave cups of water and a "thank you" to the men and women of the Division. What else could you say to those courageous people who were among the first to respond to the tragedy?

That day the Unit prepared the building, a working military installation, to be used as a hospital. However, it became a Command Post for the Volunteers who wanted to help in any way possible. I was asked to become the person in charge of all volunteers who waited outside the Armory that week.

I am still humbled by the incredible outpouring of help offered from New York City and the country. Indeed, all the best of America was on display that first week at the Armory. I trained the volunteers how to navigate and then work with what was needed at any given moment. We served food to thousands of first responders coming in from the Police, Firefighters and EMS workers along with the men and women of the 69th Regiment.

Everyone cooperated. No one said that they could not do something that was asked of them. The line of volunteers included an amazing cross-section of people: Coca-Cola employees who stayed to unload tons of materials from other companies, a Rabbi who wanted to work with the children, and a diplomat who replenished the restrooms.

One group of volunteers summed up the community effort by having a change of heart. It was a group of Texas Fundamentalist Divinity students who came up to minister and stayed to help in other ways. They were shocked by the tragedy. They waited in the volunteer line in fear, they told me. "We are in 'Babylon'". However, what they experienced was something very different from what they had been taught about New York City. One divinity student said, "I have never experienced such an outpouring of love."

"I'm by no means a legend...just a pioneer."

I was in the first class that didn't align itself with Accounting at Pace. I chose the newly created marketing program as my major. Upon graduation in 1961, I was recruited by the then world's largest alcoholic beverage company...Seagram's Distillers.

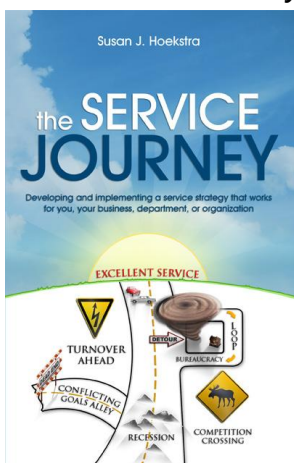
Twenty years later, I was recruited by PepsiCo and assigned to manage their primary brands under a newly formed company called PepsiCo International. This company serviced all of Eastern and Central Europe. I lived and worked in Russia and serviced all the Soviet satellite countries. I was the second American allowed to live and conduct business in the Soviet controlled countries while living in Moscow. Armand Hammer was the first American living and working in Russia under Communist rule. Through counter-balance trade, barter, since the ruble was soft currency, my division created Stolichnaya vodka worldwide to generate income and launched Pepsi, KFC, and Pizza Hut franchises throughout Eastern and Central Europe. Coke was banned during my tenure.



In 1992, I was part of the marketing team that launched Swatch Watch in the U.S. Ten years later, as senior marketing executive at The Interpublic Group, a worldwide Advertising Agency on the Mercedes-Benz account, I again worked with Swatch Watch and created the Swatch/ Mercedes partnership to create and market the Smart Car. We have sold over 900,000 cars outside the U.S. and last year it was launched in the U.S.

I am still working on the Smart Car program.

My Pace story is one of consistent and continuous networking. It started in 1978 when I was stranded in the Barbados international airport for 3 days as I waited for winds to subside so that I could fly to my homeland, St. Vincent, W.I.

A young brother and sister befriended me, as they also waited. When their mother apologized for her kids' constant interruption, we traded backgrounds. She was an International business doctoral student who lived in New York City; I was a high school teacher in Nassau, Bahamas with plans to do an MBA in Accounting in the USA. She promised to help me to choose a university. True to her word, I received information packets from Pace University. I received packets in duplicate, one from a place that I had never heard of - Pleasantville, NY; the other from New York, NY.

My new friend, although attending New York University, indicated that Pace University had the best accounting program. The Pace University packets which originated in New York City came from my friend and those from Pleasantville, NY came from her ex-husband. She made sure that I was doubly covered with Pace University information.

In 1980, my life changes drastically. I moved from Nassau, Bahamas to Greenwich, CT. I left a life of literal nirvana for a life of continuous challenges. I arrived in the US to attend Pace University, to pursue an MBA in Accounting. During registration, I realized that the full time accounting program was 2 years long, and feeling the economic pressure to work as soon as possible, I took a risk and switched to the 18-month fast-track Computer Information Systems MBA program.

I had not worked with computers before. Therefore, I literally lived at Pace White Plains and Pleasantville campuses, spending many late nights in the Pleasantville computer lab.

Due to my constant presence on these campuses, I made friends with other full time day students who were also changing their careers and lives. Our group of friends literally represented the UN – Polish, French, Indian, Korean, Italian and Caribbean, We studied together and supported one another. We also sampled all types of foods in the local area.

While pursuing the MBA program, an IBM professor was instrumental in getting me hired by IBM, one semester prior to graduation. Although I had 2 courses to complete the MBA program, my Pace professors gave me permission to miss 1 month of classes to enable me to attend the 1-month IBM training program in Dallas, TX. During my class absence my Pace friends sent me class materials weekly, and tutored me on my return to the area. Their support enabled me to successfully complete my MBA program in the time frame that I had set for myself.

To fulfill my initial plan of studies, I returned to Pace and completed a post-MBA program in Accounting. My toughest professor, also an IBMer, was instrumental in my desired move from the Information Technology area to his area of Global Financial Systems. This move then led to a 14 year career at IBM Global Finance where I traveled internationally as a lease financial and lease business development specialist.

After being downsized by IBM in 2001, I became an entrepreneur, a business and technology consultant and a Financial Advisor. My flexible schedule enabled me to volunteer as a teacher with Junior Achievement, doing what I love to do, teach. While volunteering, I recognized a gap in the educational system, which is, to teach finance and economics to teenagers.

Recently my plans and passions merged. My desire to teach teenagers about finance, my desire to honor my late father who was an educator and my feeling of responsibility to teach my teenage niece and nephew about their future financial responsibilities – all merged together. In Oct 2007, I sat in an airport in the Cayman Islands and began to write a book on teen finance. I had a 3-hour wait for my plane to NYC (long, but much shorter than the 3-day wait in Barbados, in 1978). I seem to have great beginnings in airports.

Teen Money 101 is an introduction to financial education that every teen should have, especially in these challenging economic times. The book is formatted in a 'Lights, Camera, Action' format. The 'Lights' section introduces the new terms in the chapter; the 'Camera' section depicts the teenagers story; and the 'Action' section provides activity to enforce the chapter's concepts. A "tips" section was added at the recommendation of one of my teen focus groups.

Teenagers are not taught about money in a structured way. Due to the current world economic crises, what a unique time to teach our teenagers about money and finance and therefore prepare a generation to be financially responsible adults! This workbook is intended for teenagers (ages 13 to 16). However, it can be used by any age group, as long as there is understanding of money and exchange.

Recently, a series of networking events and contacts with Pace Alumni and Pace Alumni Relations led me to the ACES organization (www.aces.org) which has contracted with me to partner with them to conduct a teacher's workshop, using my workbook and the Connecticut Curriculum standards as a base. Those teachers will then pilot their learning in 10 schools, with a vision to promote financial and economics learning among students in CT middle schools.

My two MBA programs and the professors I met at Pace, provided the foundation and the job opportunities for an exciting global Business and Technology career, and enabled me to successfully meet and surpass my goals. My Pace education experience has not only prepared me for the continuous challenges of the changing workplace, but has also provided me with a base of true friends who I have had for the last 20-plus years and will have for life.

The career services, alumni relations, alumni and friends I met at Pace have influenced my life continuously. I know that I can always pick up the phone or email my Pace contacts and responses will be immediate.

A chance meeting in the Barbados international airport brought me from Nassau, Bahamas to Pace University which opened a wealth of opportunities and experiences for me.
